

Signing of the Masig Statement: History Made

The Masig Statement was signed during the 85th Anniversary celebrations of the First Island Councillors Conference held on Masig Island in 1937. This event marked a significant step towards cultural unity and regional sovereignty for the Torres Strait and Northern Peninsula Area. It as a link connecting the past, present, and future, respecting history and securing an independent future.

The statement aims for self-determination, allowing the people of the Torres Strait and Northern Peninsula Area to freely determine their political status and pursue economic, social, and cultural development. The community plans to work with regional stakeholders and governments to achieve regional goals while safeguarding human rights.

During the 85th Anniversary Regional Celebrations, leaders provided historical context, emphasising the ongoing fight for self-determination. Then, Torres Shire Council CEO, Mrs Dalassa Yorkston, highlighted the significance of 2022, noting the support for the Uluru Statement from the Heart and the Masig Statement. She reflected on the demands made in 1937 by forebears and the progress achieved through legal recognition.

Mrs. Yorkston called for support from the Queensland and Commonwealth governments to fulfill the ambition for self-determination and regional sovereignty by the 100th anniversary in 2037. The Masig Statement will be circulated for community members to sign, symbolising their commitment to the goals set in 1937. Mayor Loban urged the Torres Shire community to stand by the council, supporting the Masig Statement, the Voice referendum, and the vision imagined by leaders in 1937.

Finally, the Torres Shire Council expressed gratitude to Mayor Philemon Mosby, Torres Strait Island Regional Council, Cr. Hilda Mosby, and the Masiq Community for hosting the historic occasion.

In the second part of this Council term, some important projects were also finished for our community. One exciting project was the Dauan Multipurpose Court, and it's a big deal for the Torres Strait Island community, especially the people living on Dauan Island. The old basketball court got a makeover, showing how much our Council cares about making life better and more fun for everyone.





Dauan Multipurpose Court: A Community Hub

The upgraded court has new basketball equipment and a modern grandstand.

It makes the whole area on Dauan Island better for sports and games, and it encourages everyone to be active and healthy. The new things also make it a safer and more enjoyable place for people of all ages.

We also built a new pathway with a ramp for people with disabilities, so now everyone in the community, no matter their abilities, can join in events and play sports. This makes our community feel more together and friendly.

The Multipurpose Court is not just for playing sports. It's like a meeting place for everyone in the community. The new grandstand is a perfect spot for watching events and games, and it helps bring everyone closer. It's making our community livelier and more connected.

Shelter for those on Poruma: Securing Our Infrastructure

The Poruma Community Roof Replacement Project is now finished, providing significant benefits for the people of the Torres Strait Islands, especially those living on Poruma Island. The Council funded the entire project with a budget of \$499,094.00, showing the Council's commitment to keeping its communities safe and well.

The project started in August 2022 and received a Certificate of Occupancy on December 1, 2023. This quick timeline shows how dedicated the Council is to fixing infrastructure problems promptly and making life better for the residents of Poruma Island.

The project involved replacing old roof sheeting and guttering on important buildings like the Poruma Community Hall, Gazebos, and Staff Accommodation. This wasn't just about fixing things; it was about making sure these crucial community spaces last a long time and stay strong. The new roofs not only protect these places from the weather but also make them safer and more comfortable for different community activities.

Finishing this project brings real and immediate benefits to the people of Poruma Island. Replacing old roof parts makes the Community Hall, Gazebos, and Staff Accommodation safer and more functional. This creates a secure and useable space for community gatherings, events, and staff living, making life better for everyone.

Also, the project fits into bigger plans to keep cultural traditions alive and boost community pride. The Poruma Community Roof Replacement keeps important structures culturally significant, serving as key places for community activities that honour and continue traditional practices.

In summary, completing the Poruma Community Roof Replacement Project isn't just about finishing construction work; it's like investing in the quality of life for Poruma Island residents. By making sure these crucial community spaces are secure, the Council is helping with safety, functionality, and cultural richness on the island, making sure the Torres Strait Islands community has a positive and lasting future.





The Interim Remote Capital Program: A Connected and Resilient Community

The Interim Remote Capital Program is doing some big things in our Torres Strait Islands, especially in Mabuiag, Iama, Dauan, Saibai, and Hammond. Its main job is to make our community housing better so that everyone has comfortable and useable place to live.

One of the most important things this program addresses is the problem of too many people living in the same houses. To do this, they're building new parts with two bedrooms and one bathroom. This way, families can have more space to live, and things can be better for everyone.

The program started planning in January 2020, and they've already finished three out of five building projects. Map St Mabuiag, O'leary St Iama, and Main Rd Dauan were ready on April 5, 2023, February 7, 2023, and September 28, 2023, respectively. Saibai and Hammond are forecast to be completed by June 2024. This shows that the program is doing well and making our houses better.

The Department of Housing and Public Works is paying for this program, and they've given \$2,139,037.27 for the project. This means they're covering all the costs, so the changes will be big and help our

community a lot.

The program is helping many islands, like Mabuiag, Iama, Dauan, Saibai, and Hammond.

This is good because it means lots of places will get better houses, helping different parts of the Torres Strait Islands.

By adding more houses, the Interim Remote Capital Program is making life better for everyone in our community. When people have better houses, they can be healthier, families can be closer, and the whole community can be happier.

These building improvements will also help our islands in other ways. Local businesses might get involved, which means more jobs and our region's economy can get stronger.

So, in short, the Interim Remote Capital Program isn't just about building houses; it's about making our lives better. By fixing the crowded houses, sticking to a good plan, paying for everything, helping lots of islands, and making our community healthier and richer, this program is a big part of making the Torres Strait Islands even better in the future.



Rural Remote Program: Building Resilience Into Our Community

The Rural and Remote Program has been working hard to make living conditions better for the people of Badu and Darnley Islands. The QBuild Darnley & Badu Plug-Ins Project is about improving houses in the community. They've finished two out of three parts of this plan, and it's already making a difference for the Torres Strait Island community.

Yalla St Badu got finished on November 29, 2022, and Egrue Village Darnley got done on November 3, 2023. The last part, School Rd Badu, will be finished in January 2024. This tells us that the program is going at a good pace to do what it planned to do.

This project started in April 2021, and they quickly got to work to help with housing problems on Badu and Darnley Islands. They planned and did the work fast, showing how much they care about what the community needs.

The whole project has \$1,420,288.51 funding, and all of it is going to QBuild. This means they have enough money to make the necessary changes and improvements.

The program is helping both Badu and Darnley Islands, and they're building new

structures with two bedrooms and one bathroom. This directly helps the people who live there have a better place to stay.

Their main goal is to fix the problem of too many people living in the same house. By building new spaces to live in, the program is trying to make the living conditions better for families.

This is a big step in making sure people have a safe place to live.

Finishing these building projects means families in Badu and Darnley Islands have more room now. This makes living conditions better, families get along better, and the whole community feels more positive. The program is really making a big change in the lives of the people who live here.

In short, the Rural and Remote Program's QBuild Darnley & Badu Plug-Ins project shows how much they want to make life better for the Torres Strait Island community.
